Stop Violence Against Women: Rally to Support Women in India and Around the World

We are horrified and saddened beyond words at the savage beating, brutal gang rape and death of Nirbhaya at the hands of her assailants in New Delhi.

On December 16^{th,} Nirbhaya (not her real name) and her male friend were returning from a movie and took a bus to go home. Nribhaya and friend were savagely beaten up; Nirbhaya suffered serious head, abdominal and genital injuries. She died on December 29^{th.}

Our heartfelt condolences and prayers go to the family of Nirbhaya and we are determined that her death not be in vain. We admire the support and the courage shown by the youth of India in protesting this violence and we implore the Government of India and police to restore the confidence of the people that justice will be done, that women will be able to go about their daily life safe and unafraid.

Equally shocking is the deteriorating condition of law and order in India. Nirbhaya was the 637th rape case registered in the City of New Delhi alone in 2012 and according to Women Against Sexual Assault and State Repression, there are 100,000 rape cases currently pending in Indian courts. Right in the middle of Nirbhaya's fight for life, rape cases were being reported from other parts of the country and some rape victims were even taking their own life.

Violence against women is a worldwide scourge and a systemic social crime. Rape is not the only crime committed against women. At every stage of their life, women suffer in many ways: female feticide and infanticide, girl child neglect, female illiteracy, sexual harassment/abuse/ rape, psychological abuse, domestic violence/homicide, economic and sexual exploitation, nutrition deprivation, poor access to health-- all are taking place against women all over the world on a daily basis. Rape is also used as a weapon of war between warring parties (for example earlier in Bosnia or presently still in the Congo).

Violence against women is a worldwide affliction so common it frequently gets little official notice. For every Malala, there are tens of thousands of girls that are kept from going to schools, and for every Nirbhaya there are thousands that are killed, or go missing and unreported (The Native Women's Association of Canada has catalogued 520 cases of missing or murdered aboriginal women, half of them since the year 2000).

We hope that Nirbhaya's assailants will be brought to justice, but we also believe that a tough criminal justice system alone is not the answer. Educational, social and political remediation of the current gender inequality and of male attitudes towards women must take place before we will see any long term improvement in justice for women. Male attitudes must change; patriarchal cultural system which is premised on the belief in women's inferiority has no place in any society.

Gender equality is a women's right. Women's problems are also men's problems, and we trust that the majority of men are able to understand this.

We call upon the governments of all countries, all men and women and especially youth, to allow Malala and Nirbhaya's sacrifice to unleash the forces that will sweep clean unjust social systems.
